BICENTENNIAL ACTIVITIES:

Local efforts with the John Coffee Chapter, DAR to celebrate this bicentennial year are off to an excellent start. The mayors of both Elba and Enterprise have signed proclamations encouraging citizens to remember the legacy of George Washington and his impact on our democracy. Programs are scheduled at the Elba Library (April 13) and Enterprise Library (April 14) to present the gift of children's books on George Washington's life.
