Cadenhead Grave Marking in Perote

The chapter is pleased to report that things are progressing well for the planned Grave marking for James Cadenhead on Sunday 18 October, 2009 at 2:30 in the afternoon at the Perote Cemetery, Perote, Bullock County. The local cemetery board has agreed to the program, and are also extremely interested. The granite "Patriot Marker Stone" (like the one used last year at the Wicker Grave Marking) has been received and Dr. Kenneth Cadenhead, author of, *The Southern Cadenheads* which tracks James Cadenhead, SR and his family from North Carolina to Alabama will be the family speaker at the event. Dr. Cadenhead descends from James Cadenhead's youngest son, Ivey. Preliminary contact with the various DAR chapters in the area has been made and Dr. Gwinn has us on his schedule to play his pipes that afternoon and bring the boy scouts to help with the color guard. The ALS-SAR has been informed of the program and initial coordination has been made with the Southern Area Color Guard Commander.

Over the past several weeks there has been a tremendous amount of interest shown in the program, not only by local citizens of Perote, but also by the Cadenhead family, and some extremely interesting pieces of history on the family and the cemetery have been uncovered.

In the 1840 census of Pike County we have an individual 90 - 100 years living in the home of James Cadenhead, Jr. and there is an annotation in the census as to James Cadenhead, Sr (98) being a pensioner. Living just down the road is William Wicker another Revolutionary War Soldier whose grave the chapter marked last year at the Ramah Primitive Baptist Church in Josie some ten miles from the Perote Cemetery where James Cadenhead is buried. Cadenhead's head stone indicates he was a "Soldier of 1776" and only indicates his first initial "J". Due to the close proximity of these two Revolutionary War Soldiers there is speculation that they probably knew each other. Cadenhead probably died in 1840 shortly after the census was taken. It must be remembered that in 1866-1867 the boundary between Pike and Bullock County shifted with Perote winding up in Bullock while Josie remained in Pike County.

The Troy Messenger has been a leading newspaper publication in Pike County for many years. In the edition of October 17,1889 there was an article on "Some Old People" who were pioneers in Pike County and who had seen the changes over the years. One of those featured was J.N. Sanders who grew up in Georgia and eventually moved to Alabama and settled near Perote in 1853. In the article the author states, "Mr. Sanders' great grand father, John Cadenhead, was a revolutionary soldier, and his bones rest in the soldier's cemetery at Perote, and receives the same care and attention from the ladies memorial association of that place that the confederate soldier's graves do, so highly was he esteemed by the people of that community". It is unknown why the name "John" was used and it is also unclear why the notation of a "soldier's cemetery" was used. In looking deeper into the history of the cemetery itself, a deed has been located dated 20 August 1857, between William Hixon and W.D. Bryan, et al, "trustees for and in behalf of the persons who are or may be interested in the Perote Burial Grounds" where in consideration of \$1.00, Hixon conveyed some three acres of land for the cemetery which is partially described as "for the purposes and use of a burial ground and for no other purpose a certain tract of parcel of land in the Village of Perote whereon is the present grave yard and adjoining it and described as beginning at a stake near the old road leading to the Methodist Church..." To make this whole story even more interesting is that one of the current Cemetery Board members with whom the chapter has been dealing is Mack Hixon, the great grandson of William Hixon.

In her book, "One Hundred Fifty Years in Pike County, Alabama, 1821-1971", Margaret Pace Framer notes "On September 7, 1840 a presbytery composed of William Pain and James Caddenhead examined fifteen prospective members of Ramah and found them orthodox and in good standing. These became the charter members of Ramah. On the following day five additional members were received by letter. Elder James Caddenhead was chosen as the first pastor." The original minutes of these meetings still exist and copies are available in the Troy Public Library. These minutes reflect James Caddenhead (Jr) as being the moderator of the Ramah Primitive Baptist Church until April, 1842. The written minutes reflect the use of the double "d" in the spelling Caddenhead. So, we have the Cadenhead family involved in the formation of the church where William Wicker would eventually be a member and eventually buried.

It is hoped that even more information can be found before the actual grave marking in October.

Grave markings: Some probably wonder if the time, work and effort in conducting a significant grave marking program is really worth the effort. Certainly one of the basic tenants of the Sons of the American Revolution is to honor our patriotic ancestors. It is felt that the Wiregrass Chapter has done an outstanding job in stepping up and meeting this challenge to honor revolutionary war patriots. In the past five - six years the chapter has marked the graves of four revolutionary war soldiers within the Wiregrass area (William Carter, William Harrison, William Wicker and Solomon Wright), while assisting in a similar program (Ruben Ard) conducted by the DAR ladies. In each of these very positive feed back was received from the descendants of the soldier recognized.

The chapter has received a copy of an e-mail sent to the GASSAR from a Robert Harrison in Atlanta with a picture of the Harrison headstone in Kingston. This individual is interested in joining the SAR and the chapter has been asked to provide family information and grave marking details. The efforts we make today to honor our patriots, are repaid when younger generations realize their lineal heritage in the founding of this great country.
