Part of the January meeting was devoted to planning for the upcoming year, and very interesting programs/events are on tap for the next twelve months. This date is flexible based on the activities of the DAR chapter and receiving permission from the church to hold the program. November again will be dedicated to our veterans while our December Chartering Banquet and Installation of officers will be held on the 13th of December.

These special activities are in addition to our traditional youth activities such as JROTC and Roy Shoffner Awards to high school students, and identification of potential recipients of a flag certificate. The chapter's "Books for Veterans" program is still active and members are always needed to drop a box or two off at veterans' facilities across the state. Seeking new members continues to be a high priority.

These planned events do not "just happen" but require the help and assistance of all chapter members. Please let President Fuller know where you would like to participate. It is your dedication and willingness to say "yes" that has led to the continued growth of the Wiregrass Chapter, and its being recognized as one of the most active chapters within the ALSSAR.

Troy SAR Chapter

Work on the establishment of a new SAR chapter in Troy continues and has been very successful to date. Two applications have already been submitted, and three are in the final stages for submission. Additional potential members have been identified and posters about the potential chapter have been placed both in the library in Troy and Brundidge. One of the next steps will be to contact the Troy Messenger to get some articles in the paper about the SAR and the planned chapter. An initial organizational meeting is scheduled for the 15th of March at the Troy Public Library at 6:30 PM. At that time it is hoped to have some color guard support and present at least two new member certificates. Numerous pioneer Pike County families have been identified with roots back to a Revolutionary War Soldier. Colors of the Revolutionary War Regimental Coat

Those who have attended various National SAR functions or grave markings where members of the color guard were present, may well have wondered about the various colors and cuts of the uniforms worn by the guardsmen. It should be understood that the uniforms of the Revolutionary War period were actually an exaggeration of the civilian attire of the time and the cut of the coat was often dependent about the soldier's individual tailor. Likewise, the fabric used was a function of what was available to the tailor. No standard patterns are known to exist, so usually the dimensions of the cuffs, collars, lapels and button arrangement would vary.

Unfortunately, very few original Revolutionary War uniforms are still in existence today, but some documents relating to the colors to be utilized in the uniform coat do still exist. Like the various colors used in shoulder boards worn on Army dress uniforms which identify an officer's corps, the colors of the regimental coat helped identify from which colony or area the soldier served.

At first very few individuals possessed a uniform, and there was a wide variation among these. When General Washington took command most senior officers elected to duplicate his blue and buff choice. In an attempt to standardize the colors of uniform coats, Washington issued the following General Order:

Headquarters Moores House October 2, 1779

The following re the Uniforms that have been determined for the troops of those states respectively as soon as the state of the public supplies will permit these being furnished. Accordingly, and in the meantime it is recommended to the Officers to endeavor to accommodate their Uniforms to this standard that when the men come to be supplied there may be proper uniformity.

New Hampshire - Blue faced with White Buttons and Lining White Massachusetts
Rhode Island
Connecticut

New York - Blue faced with Buff White Linings and Buttons New Jersey

North Carolina - Blue faced with Blue Button holes edged with narrow white lace or tape. Buttons and Linings White South Carolina

Georgia

Artillery and Artillery Artifers - Blue faced with Scarlet, Scarlet linings, yellow buttons, Yellow bound hats. Coats edges with narrow lace or tape and button holes with the same

Light Dragoons—The whole Blue faced with White, buttons and linings white.

It should be noted that this General Order applied only to the Continental Army. The militia and State Troops were not governed by it. Likewise special units, such as the Commander-in-Chief Guards, and Von Heer's Provost Guard, appear to have also been exempt from the orders. As can be seen except for the Artillery head gear was not addressed nor the color for the breeches, waist coats or shirts. Those interested in obtaining a uniform that closely resembles one worn by a patriot ancestor can normally obtain additional information from uniform suppliers.
